Course objectives	
The course aims to introduce students to the basics of public administration and public law.	
Course Description	
<p>The course will be divided into three parts: the first one will deal with Public Administration, the second one will delve into Administrative Law, while to the third one is devoted to the administrative implications of European integration.</p> <p>We particularly examine administrative systems, sources, hierarchy of norms and functions of law in the administrative process and the constitutional role of judicial review. We also look at developments such as new public management, independent regulatory agencies as well as the europeanisation of public administrative law</p> <p>The main characteristics of both European administration and administrative activity (such as , e.g., polycentric organization, normative sources, mixed proceedings, remedies) and at the same time the main differences vis à vis domestic legal systems and national</p>	

administrative law are addressed. Also, the international projection of European Administrative Law will be addressed.
